Home From Europe

is home from overseas after an absence of nearly four years, having arrived in Canada aboard the Nievev Amsterdam last week. Eldrid volunteered in March 1941, and after training at Toronto, Brantford and Camp Borden he landed in Scotland in October. For nearly two years he was stationed in England till he took part in the invasion of Sicily and Italy. In the nineteen months spent there, he learned to like the Italian natives and their country. During his stay he saw many of the wonders of the old world, including the cities of Florence and Rome. He has seen how demolished parts of Italy were, and says small places were literally wiped off the map.

During his term of army life it was his job to cook for the troops in his unit, and army rations were, on the whole, pretty good, he states. They always had plenty to eat although the civilians, including children, often suffered from malnutrition, especially before the fruit season. Soap was always scarce. Leaving Italy, his unit moved to

The boys received a grand welcome at Halifax on their return to Canada when decorated troop ships came out four miles to meet the incoming troops and to welcome them home.

RATIONED MEAT IN LOCKERS must be declared

All consumers who store rationed meat in lockers must declare in writing to the nearest Ration Branch Office the quantity of rationed meat they had in storage on September 10, 1945

Rationed meats include all cooked, canned, fancy and "red" meats. For a full list of rationed meats, see the Consumer Meat Coupon Value Chart. Copies are available at all Ration Branch Offices.

COUPONS MUST BE SURRENDERED FOR STORED MEAT

Consumers must surrender coupons for all meat held in lockers over and above 4 lbs. for each person in the household at a rate of 2 lbs. per coupon. However, no more than one-half of the "M" coupons in the ration books of the consumer and his household need be surrendered.
