Meaford—Mrs. Jesse Gibbons, who has resided for years in Meaford celebrated her 96th birthday on Sept. 9th.

Durham—A memorial window to the memory of the late Flying Officer, Robert James Webster was unveiled in Trinity Anglican Church, Meaford, at the morning service on Sept. 2, conducted by Rev. R. S. Jones.

Dundalk—A ring lost 26 years ago by "Wally" Wellwood shortly after his return from the last war, was found recently, still in perfect condition, by D. T. Wright while digging potatoes in his garden. The ring was a wide type made especially for the 4th Canadian Mounted Rifles with which "Wally" served overseas, and bore his initials as well as C. M. R. in raised design on the top.

A former resident of Hatherston district, John Winters, died Sept. 1st, in Collingwood Hospital.

Mrs. Wm. Talbot of Inistogoe district died at her home, Highway 10, on Aug. 22nd. Surviving are four sons and four daughters.

William T. Mitchell, resident of Shrigley district for over three-quarters of a century, died at Collingwood on August 30th. The Mitchell family played an important part in the community life at Shrigley for many years. He is survived by a daughter, Maude.

Southampton Rotary Club has taken an option on Hillcrest Lodge, and plan to convert it into a Memorial Hospital, in memory of those who have paid the supreme sacrifice in the Second Great War. The building was one of the best-known summer hotels in the district.

With a view to finding some method of accommodation for sport next winter, a committee appointed at Shelburne are investigating the possibility of buying an airplane hangar from the War Assets Corporation for a rink, their former arena having been destroyed by fire in the winter of '43-44.

In appreciation of the services they have rendered, returned men were presented with a leather wallet on behalf of Kimberley Community at a Sports Day held there on Labor Day.

Flesherton—Five returned men were given a public reception in the Fraternal Hall, Flesherton when each was presented with \$10.00 by the Welfare League. Those honoured were: Fred Gorrell, Jim Thurston, Albert Hislop, O. J. Rowe and Ray Richards.

Meaford is to have a new industry. A factory building, part of the old wheel barrow plant, has been purchased by two returned men who were formerly associated with the North American Bent Chair Co. of Owen Sound, and it is expected the newly-purchased building will be used for the manufacture of furniture.

As a result of serious overcrowding in the present high school, at a recent meeting of Hanover Council, it was agreed to engage an architect to draw plans for an addition to the present building.

In an effort to aid prospective industries, the town of Collingwood has passed a by-law voting \$50,000 for the erection of buildings for selected manufacturing plants that are prepared to locate in that town.

For the first time in the history of Dufferin County, a school bus, contracted for by Mono Township Area Board began operations this year at the request of parents of high school children. Parents of children who travel by it will pay one-third of the cost of operating the bus, amounting to approximately \$4.00 per pupil per month. Fifteen pupils were transported on the opening day.

As a result of a request from Fourth Line ratepayers, a school bus line service is now in operation which will convey about ten pupils to and from Meaford High School.

At the first meeting for the fall term of Dufferin High School board, it was reported the enrolment would approach or reach the one hundred and twenty mark.—To bring the teaching staff up to pre-war strength a fifth teacher has been engaged.—The board also passed a resolution as being strongly opposed to the granting of work permits under sixteen years of age.
