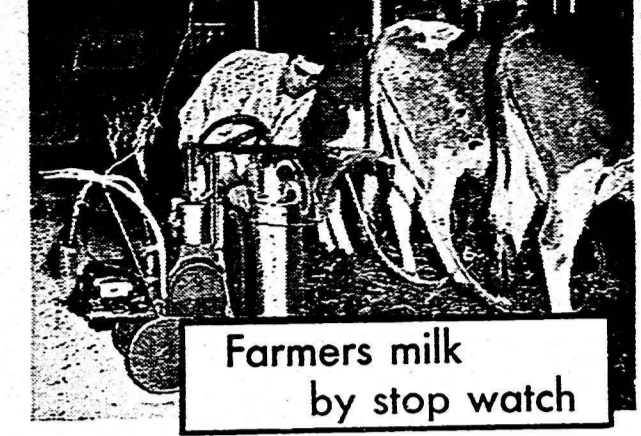

WALTERS FALLS
 [Held over from last week.]
 The funeral of Mrs. Lettie Reid was held Monday afternoon, September 17, with service in the United Church, Walters Falls and interment at Lakeview Cemetery, Meaford. Rev. J. M. Prasse conducted the service and presided from Rev. W. J. Lee. These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the lamb. Hymns were "Rock of Ages" and "Blest be the Tie that Binds." The church was filled with relatives and friends. Many and beautiful were the floral tributes which included contributions from the family, the W. A. of Walters Falls, and many friends in the West.
 Elizabeth Sheperdson was born on the 20th of July, 1882. Her father was William Joe Sheperdson, licensed auctioneer for the County of Grey and her mother, was Essie King of Euphrasia township. Her early life was spent in Walters Falls where she took an active part in the church and community. Her interest in the choir here and in Perth, Sask., extended over a period of 38 years.
 In June, 1912 she was married to Frank Reid, then of Perth, Sask., by the Rev. H. E. W. Kemp of Heathcote, being the second bride married in the Methodist Church, Walters Falls. Her husband was the first to build in Perth, Sask., where he opened a general store, and became the first postmaster and telephone central. In these labors, his wife was an active participant. The twenty-fifth anniversary of their wedding was made the occasion of a church and community celebration when they were presented with a silver-

- On and after October 1, 1945, gasoline will no longer be marked for special uses.
- Marking of gasoline for special uses under the jurisdiction of the Oil Controller for Canada having been discontinued, the tax exemption purchase permit system is thereby ended.
- Farmers, fishermen, guides and tourist outfitters will be entitled to claim refund of the Provincial Gasoline Tax where applicable. Claims, accompanied by receipted invoices, must be submitted to the Gasoline Tax Branch, Department of Highways, Parliament Buildings, Toronto within six months from date of payment of invoices.
- A simplified method of assuring prompt payment of refunds, eliminating affidavits for each claim, has been worked out.

As there is no rationing of gasoline in Canada, marked gasoline, under the jurisdiction of the Oil Controller for Canada, has been eliminated, thereby ending the tax exemption purchase permit system.
 To meet the desire of everyone to be relieved of wartime restrictions, the Provincial Government has developed a new system as free from controls and difficulties as possible. A simplified refund form has been prepared which eliminates the necessity of an affidavit being taken for each refund claim. This form may be obtained on application to the Gasoline Tax Branch, Department of Highways, Toronto, Ontario.

- The ending of marked gasoline sale removes difficulties made necessary by this wartime control.
- Complaints were made that marked gasoline was detrimental to the equipment in which it was being used.
- Records and reports necessary under the marked gasoline system will no longer be required.
- Extra storage facilities will be unnecessary for the separate storage of graded and marked gasoline with consequent saving to the consumer.
