Mix 4 ounces (about a cup) of stale bread crumbs with 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon and a half of one grated nutmeg, and mix with the apples. Beat the yolks of 4 eggs and add to the mixture. Stir in the whites carefully, until the whole is moist enough to hold together, then steam for 2 hrs. in a well-greased mould. Serve hot with a foamy sauce, which should supply enough sweetening unless the apples are excessively sour.

Suet Pudding

1 cup suet (chopped fine), 1 cup molasses, 1 cup bread crumbs, ½ cup sour milk, 1½ cups flour, ½ tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. allspice, ¼ tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. allspice, ¼ tsp. cloves, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup prumes or stewed fruit, grated rind ½ lenhon.
