## Grey County

### Farm Forum News

(Edited by Elwood Lemon)  
On Monday evening, October 29, Farm Radio Forums throughout Ontario began the winter series of meetings and discussions. Grey County started well by setting a record on the first night with 69 forums reporting attendance of 1299 and followed up a week later with 76 forums reporting an attendance of 1384, the largest number of forums reported in any one county in the Province. Thirteen new forums reported by six of the starter forums failed to report.

On October 29, the question of "How important are farm and non farm people to each other?" brought many subjects for discussion into the open. Forums agreed that farm and non farm people are growing closer together, but "Crawford" forum said that the farmer would feel a little better toward his city cousin if he had a few more conveniences and a fairer share of the nation's income. "Desboro North" forum sums up what all forums agreed when they stated that "we seemed to learn, more and more, that no group, community, or nation could live alone." All forums agreed that we could benefit socially and scientifically from the High Schools and Universities.

The Hog Marketing Scheme was discussed in many forums and found favorable. On November 5, the question of "How can farmers reach full production without suffering from glutted markets?" brought forth the statement that no one factor or agency can solve the problem. Forums agreed that distribution (including consumer buying power) is the real problem,—not production. Discussions revealed that forums thought present price levels were high enough if the cost of living remains the same and the cost of labour comes down; that floor prices would help and a preference shown for steady prices; that government contracts are good provided they are made by people versed in Agriculture; that widespread open markets would depress prices; and that the government should carry food reserves but not by controlled production.

"Blind Line Hustlers" and "Saugeen Valley" forums believe that if the Food and Agricultural Organization functions properly we will have the answer to the main question. "North Bentinck-Glenelg" forums said that "Co-operative Marketing and producer controlled sales organization will enable farmers to reach full production without glutted markets."

The meeting disapproved the proposed opening of a hotel at Dornoch. An apple and a quiz contest were interesting recreation. A cup of tea was enjoyed by all. The Forum will meet next week at the home of Kenneth Atken.
