

INEXPENSIVE PLUM PUDDING

1 cup of soft bread crumbs, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup seedless raisins, ¼ cup slivered candied peels, ¼ cup nuts (optional), ½ cup once sifted flour, ½ tsp baking soda, 1 tsp salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, ¼ tsp. each of nutmeg and ginger, ¾ tsp. (each) ground cloves and allspice, two-thirds cup finely chopped fresh suct, two-thirds cup (each) grated raw carrott, raw potato and raw apple, 2 eggs.




