Mr. Langton, acting representative for the last eight months, has been transferred to the Cayuga agricultural office to serve as assistant in the first short course at the J. Farmer Community centre for Haldimand County.

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Grey County Farm Forums

On Monday evening, December 3rd, 30 farm forums met to discuss whether or not we in Grey County, suffer from lack of vitamins for winter and mineral salts. Attendance for the evening totaled 188 for the best attendance to date in any county in Canada.

Farm Forums in Grey County have now become an institution and are definitely here to stay. They are a definite need of each and every community. If your community has no forum it should have one and can be simply limited to a few neighbors into your home on Monday evening and sending the name and address of your secretary to the Ontario office of Farm Forum in Toronto.

Few groups throughout the country give an outright answer to whether we suffer from deficiencies of vitamins and minerals. Answers were lacking. Christmas was fairly well fed but could stand a few more vitamins, more health conscious (due to Women's Institute).

School Lunches: Nearly 20% of the children have something hot for their lunch through the use of the hot water bottle. About 20% think that hot lunches are not necessary, too much to eat. "Farm Forum" forum wants a dietitian to give a course on the preparation of school lunches.

Deficiencies: So and Water: Goitre, tooth decay, arthritis, and rheumatism are mentioned as being the result of deficiencies with tooth decay leading. "12 Con. N. Sullivan" forum says the main need of the community is to have a dietitian to give a course on the preparation of school lunches.

How to build up good health? Municipal health services with their program of health examinations and control instead of waiting for the disease to strike is considered by most forums to be the way for a healthier Grey County. Fly control by the use of D.D.T., disposal of manure piles, compulsory immunization, good meals, and recreational facilities were also mentioned in connection with the building up of good health.

"Farm Quotes: 'Waltz Corner' forum wants practical nursing course for farm women. One forum wants a baker and all bakers to sell approved bread. 'Saugen Valley' forum says the school should meet on the importance of the family garden.

"Boothwell's Corners" forum is buying Canada approved bread on a co-operative basis, good idea.
