Another Strike

The United States government isst week made ready to take over operations of the tugboat system in New York's hig harbor as a paralyzing strike tied up commercial shipping. And meanwhile New York's 7,500,000 residents were cut off by the strike from an estimated 80 per cent. of their fuel supplies and nearly half their food supplies. There was an estimated week's supply of each on hand.


