Remove Red Netting

An order-in-council ripping the red netting from peaches was published in the Canada Gazette recently. The red netting, long a subject of complaint because of its ability to conceal defects of poor quality fruit, goes under the ban effective Sept. 1, after which "no person shall use any reddish or orange-coloured covering for heaped baskets of peaches." In an interiew Agriculture Minister Gardiner said there had been a "universal demand" to do away with the netting and he believed the Ontario Agriculture Department would co-operate with his department in carrying out the order.
