An order-in-council ripping the red netting from peaches was published in the Canada Gazette recently. The red netting, long a subject of complaint because of its ability to conceal defects of poor quality fruit, goes under the ban effective Sept. 1, after which "no person shall use any reddish or orange-colored covering for heaped baskets of peaches." In an interview Agriculture Minister Gardiner said there had been a "universal demand" to do away with the netting and he believed the Ontario Agriculture Department would co-operate with his department in carrying out the order.

Plant and Conserve Urges Horticultural Pres.

The following message has been received by the president of the local Horticultural Society wherein every one is urged to do something to help the starving peoples of the world. The idea sponsored by the Ontario Horticultural Association suggests we supplement our flower gardens with vegetables in this post-war year, so that canned goods may be made available for overseas.

Here is the letter:
Dear Horticulturists:
As it is impossible for me to attend your meetings in person, nevertheless I have been thinking so much of you, not only as Societies, but as individual members.

Never in the history of mankind, of our Empire, of our Nation and also of our Association, have such opportunities and temptations been placed before us. Opportunities for leadership and encouragement in our chosen and loved avocation. Temptations to rest on our laurels won during the war and, because more money is in circulation, and the urgent need of starving people overseas is not right before our eyes—not in our midst—we are sorely tempted to sit back and do nothing.

Have you been thinking of what will follow when millions of people are starving? History has proved that from famine stricken areas epidemics have emerged and become widespread. Our world is becoming small. Hungry people are easily moved toward riots and destruction of that which they cannot replace. Thus the appeal is not only from a humanitarian point of view, but also for preservation of our democracy and ideals for which the war has been fought. What can we do?

1st PLAN: Instead of concentrating on flower gardens alone, as some do, could we not grow all the vegetables and food stuffs possible according to the size of our gardens, not only for summer use but for winter consumption. Aim to keep out of the market, thereby making it possible to send greater tonnage overseas. Don't buy a bag or a can. Food experts advise that famine conditions will continue until 1947 harvest is available at least; some say 1948.

2nd CONSERVE: Beginning now, if we have not already done so, could we not plan meals so that not a mouthful is wasted?

You ask, "Are we not a Horticultural Association?" Yes, all the more reason, with our knowledge and experience, we live up to our true selves and be humanitarians first. This is our great opportunity. We are a great organization, much has been accomplished, but the help of every member is needed, every member counts, that the existence of our Association be justified.

How are we answering the challenge? Are we doing our best to encourage teachers, children, new gardeners, newcomers, community gardeners? Let us get our work placed on a strong basis, then the other activities will follow naturally.

Knowing these ideas must have occurred to many, could not each and every one develop never and better plans and work toward one great accomplishment with interest and enthusiasm.
