Second Annual Hereford Sale Totals \$6060

Thirty-three fine animals, consigned by a dozen breeders from Grey and Bruce Coursies were auctioned off for a 10.11 of \$5,000 at the second annual sale held in the skating rink, Manbrale, on Tuesday afternoon by Grey and Bruce Hereford Breeders' Association. Fifteen sires sold for a total of \$2940, or an average of \$196, while 18 females average \$173.33, and totalled \$3120.

Previous to the auction by William F. McKay of Meaford, the animals were judged by R. H. Graham of the Dominion Livestock Branch, Toronto. Hartler, Spring Bay, Manitoulin, for \$270, who also bought the top-priced female from Boyd Porteous, Owen Sound, for \$275. Mr. Hartley bought a total of 5 head for \$1216. Arthur Lemon and Sons of Balaclava sold 6 animals for a total of \$1260. Local buyers included Harold Wilson, R.R. 6, Markdale, D. G. McKennitt, Holland Centre, and Gordon Quinton of Meaford.
