





4 cups cooked lima beans 2 tablespoons chopped parsley 1/4 teaspoon curry powder Combine lima beans and parsley. To mayonnaise add the curry an hili powders, blend well. Add to beans and mix . together lightly. Hard cooked eggs and radishes may also be served with this salad.

Vegetable-Meat Salad cups chopped cooked meat 2 tomatoes, chopped coarsely or 3 radishes, chopped 2 tablespoons chopped parsley 1 cup chopped cucumber 4 cup chopped green onion
