Move to Replace Trees **Destroyed in Grey County**

To increase the forest acreage, the Grey County Council has authorized the purchase of an additional 600 acres of land in Glenely Township, at an average figure of \$4.00 per acre, located within ten miles of the present holdings west of Markdale.

The newest purchase will mean that 1,900 acres are included in the county's reforestation plan, one parcel of land being in Holland Township and two in Glenely Township.

A recent survey showed that of the 71,000 trees planted in the Holland Township area this spring, 90 per cent are living. A holding near Durham has been planted to replace the thousands of Scotch pine trees which have been cut for Christmas trees in the past few years.
