Glencol Council

The Council met on July 6th according to adjournment. One member was absent. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. A deputation were read and adopted. A deputation from near Markdale waited on the Council in regard to improving some narrow hills on the old 10th Con. There was also a deputation from the Durham Hospital Board asking to have a representative from Glencol appointed to the Hospital Board. Mr. W. G. Firth waited on the Council re one fifth mill for the Federation of Agriculture. The Council appointed R. C. Robinson as a representative for the Hospital Board. The Reeve was authorized to sign warrant for tax sale. By-laws to appoint Everett Parker as Assessor and a supplementary By-law to cover the expenditure for a road maintainer were passed. Road Voucher No. 7 amounting to \$6885.93 was passed for payment. Claims for sheep killed by dogs amounting to \$190.00 were ordered paid. Premium on Workmen's Compensation Insurance amounting to \$46.12 was ordered paid. The Treasurer was authorized to pay all other accounts amounting to \$168.85. The Treasurer was instructed to return to the Sandy Contracting Co. Ltd. of Goderich their guarantee cheque re gravel contract.

There being no further business before the meeting the Council adjourned to meet August 3rd.

Loughheed - Seabrook—That Road Voucher No. 7, 1946 amounting to \$2092.60 be read and ordered paid.

Loughheed - Seabrook—That the following expenses for field day be paid: Eugene Thompson, \$4.00; Ted Howey, \$4.00; Len Haines \$3.00; Beverly Cook, \$3.00; Walt, Smithson, \$3.00 Carman Sewell, \$3.00; Russel Hill, \$—.—Carried.

Rennie - Loughheed—That this Council order one snow-plough and wing from J. D. Adams Co.—Carried.

Rennie - Seabrook—That this Council appoint the Reeve and Road Superintendent as a committee to get prices on a building for road machinery.—Carried.
