**HOW TO BAIT HOOK WITH WORM**  
TOLD BY IZAAK WALTON

Every fisherman has his own ideas of how to bait a hook with a "dex worm." Some thread the hook from one end of the bait to the other, while others snag the hook wherever they can hold the worm still enough to impale it. However, according to Walton, there's a proper way to bait a hook to get best results, so, as a contribution to the success of bait fishermen, we quote the method as explained in "The Compleat Angler," that standard work first published by Walton in 1653.

"Suppose it be a big lob-worm, put your hook into him somewhat a little below the middle, having so done, draw your worm above the arming of your hook; but note that at the entering of your hook it must not be at the head-end of the worm but at the tail-end of him, that the hook may come out toward the head-end; and having drawn him above the arming of your hook, then put the point of your hook again into the very head of the worm, till it comes near to the place where the point of the hook first came out; and then draw back that part of the worm that was above the shank or arming of your hook, and so fish with it. And if you mean to fish with two worms, then put the second on before you turn back one hook's head of the first worm; you cannot lose above two or three worms before you attain to what I direct you; and having attained it, you will find it very useful."

Try this method next time, but don't forget, "tail first!"


