TABLE TALKS... Vegetable Plates

Everybody knows today that no food is more important than vegetables. Nutritionists recommend at least one raw and two cooked vegetables every day. The home economy of the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture suggest three recipes for Vegetable dishes.

Spinach Puff Piquant
2 lbs. fresh spinach
OR 2 cups cooked spinach
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup chopped green onion
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup milk
2 eggs, well-beaten

Wash spinach thoroughly, trim and cook for 10 minutes. Drain and chop very fine. Add the remaining ingredients and mix well. Turn into greased baking dish and cover. Set in a pan of water and oven poach in a moderately hot oven 375 deg. F. for 45 minutes. Six servings.

Sweet Sour Beans
6 cups beans cut in 1-inch pieces
1 cup boiling water
1 tablespoon minced onion
2 tablespoons melted fat
1 tablespoon brown sugar
1 tablespoon vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of cinnamon

Cook beans in boiling water for 15 minutes. Brown onion in the fat. Add sugar, vinegar, salt and cinnamon. Add to cooked beans. Simmer 10 minutes.

Cheese Ring with Vegetables
1 cup milk
1 cup dry bread crumbs
1 egg
1/2 cups cooked macaroni
1 cup cheese, diced
1 tablespoon minced parsley
3 tablespoons melted fat
1 teaspoon minced onion
1/2 teaspoon salt

Scald milk, add to bread. Add well beaten egg and other ingredients. Pour into a greased ring mould. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven 350 deg. F. for 50 minutes. Turn out on a hot platter and fill with hot mixed vegetables, green beans, onions and carrots or vegetable marrow and baby beets. Six servings.

Note: For variety tomato, cheese or cream cheese may be used with the vegetables.

How Can I prevent the oven from cooling too quickly?
A. When the oven has been very hot, it often cools too quickly if the oven door is opened. Instead of doing this, if a pan of cold water is placed in the oven it will lower the temperature gradually.

Q. How can I prepare a good toilet water?
A. By mixing two ounces of cold flower water with an equal quantity of distilled water.

Q. How can I prevent the discoloration caused by a bruise?
A. If very hot cloths are applied, one right after another, it often prevents discoloration.

Q. How can I economize on butter?
A. One pound of butter can be made equal to two pounds by adding gradually to one pint of butter one pint of milk and a little salt; beat with an egg-beater until smooth. Put into a mold and set in a cool place.

Q. How can I keep winter coats free from moths?
A. Have a small window light in the coat closet. It will allow the air to circulate and keep the coats dry and fresh.

Q. How can I remove fly paper from garments and furniture?
A. By washing with lukewarm water.
