Norman Tosh Drowned At Hayward Falls

Norman Douglas Tosh, three-year-old adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Tosh of Concession A., Glenelg Township, was drowned Tuesday afternoon, September 10, at 1:30 when his father's car, rolled into the pond at Hayward Falls. Mr. Tosh had just driven into the gate when the car, which was on level ground, coasted to an incline a few feet away and toppled 18 feet into the deep pond.

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A wrecker was brought from Durham and a boat was used to locate the car, which had disappeared far below the surface. Men who were thrashing at the farm of Basil Davis nearby aided in the recovery, after the pond had been drained of as much water as possible. The windows in the car were broken to rescue the body of the little boy.

Dr. Armstrong of Durham was called to the scene and attempted unsuccessfully to revive the unfortunate little victim. Dr. D. B. Jamieson, the coroner, decided that no inquest will be necessary. The boy's body was found pinned under the cushion of the rear seat of the car, although he had been sitting in the front seat when the accident occurred.

The little boy was adopted only last June by Mr. and Mrs. Tosh and had been happily situated in their home since that time. The tragic accident has shocked and saddened the entire district.—Sun Times.

Stamp Out T.B. Keep Your X-RAY Appointment

Have Your Chest X-Rayed

Next Friday and Saturday, September 27 and 28, every citizen of this community will be offered a free chest service. The Markdale Rotary Club in co-operation with the Ontario Tuberculosis Association and the Ontario Department of Health has arranged to provide every man, woman and child in this area with a free chest examination without any cost or obligation whatsoever.

This campaign is part of a Province-wide plan begun last year to cut in half the incidence of tuberculosis within the next ten years. Local officials planning the survey estimate that 1500 persons will receive a free chest x-ray.

That prevention is better than cure, all will agree. In the prevention of tuberculosis, mass x-ray surveys have been found to be among the most effective measures. It is hoped, therefore, that everyone will take advantage of this excellent opportunity to protect their own health, the health of their family and their community.

The menace of tuberculosis lies largely in the fact that a person can appear perfectly healthy and feel fit and yet have the disease. Happily, when detected in its early stage it can be cleared up fairly quickly and the person returned to his employment. The surest way of finding out whether one has tuberculosis is through the x-ray examination. Each person found to have a shadow of the disease may then immediately receive the necessary attention.

The survey has yet another benefit. It will greatly arouse public awareness to this insidious disease. With this awareness fully aroused, there are good prospects that this grim enemy of our people will eventually be done away with.
