

A CORNER ON TOBACCO

The annual Ontario production of tobacco is about 97,000,000 pounds—its value around \$30,000,000. In the southwest corner of the province, some 90,000 acres are plented to it and the Ontario crop represents nine-tenths of the Dominion yield. 85% of this is high-grade flue-cured—the less-carefully-treated burley and dark-leaf making up the rest. It is an industry in which a few experts prepare the scene for a sudden inrush by thousands of workers in the crucial harvest weeks.
