1637 X-Rayed at T.B. Clinic Over 700 Children Attend

One thousand, six hundred and thirty seven people attended the T.B. Clinic held in the Markdale Armoury on Friday and Saturday of last week. On Friday afternoon over seven hundred school children were photographed which was a record attendance according to an official of the technicians' staff.

Announcement was made to the effect that 1637 x-ray plates were taken at the T.B. Clinic on Friday and Saturday. A full report appears elsewhere.

The Clinic was arranged in Markdale by the local Rotary Club in co-operation with the Ontario Department of Health and the Canadian Tuberculosis Association. The area allotted to the Markdale Rotary Club to look after was a large one, and the committee in charge should be congratulated for a job well done.

Mr. Ted Cramp was responsible for the advertising and through his efforts the people in the district were made aware of the importance of the Clinic.

Although the number attending the Clinic was well over that expected, it was quite noticeable that all who could have availed themselves of this service did not attend. Experience has shown that people of advanced age are often carriers of Tuberculosis and the only reliable check is an x-ray.
