

Mr. Drew out-bic them by offering to pay 50%. Mr. Hepburn in 1945 raised the bid to 90%, and Premier Drew then went "up to 95%."

These three party-first, vote-catching Premiers and Ministers Education have sacrificed the Public School in New Ontario and many other parts of the province. The Cornish Brief demonstrates dearly that the Department of Education should never be in the hands of Party Leader. The result has always been a "sell-out" of the Public Schools and a new "grab" of public money for Roman Catholic Separate
