

On display at the Current River school was a nine pound golden eagle with a wing spread of 6 1-2 feet, taken to the school by a pupil whose father had shot it some miles north of Port Arthur. Contemplating some comment on the shooting of such a bird, this newspaper (the Port Arthur News-Chronicle) made some further in quiry and was glad to learn that it was not a case of wanton shooting, as might have been at first supposed. The bird had been caught in a steel trap on a trap line in the woods. Under the circumstances there was no alternative for the trapper.

The opportunity still remains to point out that the golden eagle is bird that should not be shot. The species is rare, so rare that this specimen is being sent by Principal Garton to the Ontario Museum for preservation. Neither does it do any damage to mankind or to the things that man values.
