A new service is available to the public this month at Markdale Garage where a spray booth has been under construction for several months. The room just completed in the body shop at the rear of the general garage, is already turning out paint jobs done under ideal conditions that will make the state of the property of the day's proceed-

already turning out paint jobs done under ideal conditions that will make this body shop efficient as well as upto-to-date. Along with this is a full line of equipment for body work including an automatic air hammer and 10-ton push and full jack.

The paint room itself is approximately 25 by 16 feet and 10 feet high and is large enough to hold any make of car as well as 1½ ton truck. The walls are designed with six air filters, with an additional vent to filter the air being taken into the furnace. Two hot air pipes conduct heat which changes the temperature of the room from 70 to 120 degrees in about three minutes. Along with this is an exhaust fan which changes the air in the room in one and a half minutes.
