The lunch should supply its full quota of necessary food if the day's meals are to add up to 100%. A good lunch contains a protein (in form of meat, fish, theese, eggs, nuts or dried beans), a fruit or vegetable, frequently raw, and milk in the form of beverage, creamed soup, or dessert, as well as energy foods in the form of Canada-approved bread. 

Cantaloupes Grow On-Pumpkin Vines

Cantaloupes from pumpkin vines are a new Soviet contribution to horticulture developed by a woman botanist named Serafima Lebedye-

By grafting cantaloupe shoots onto pumpkin vines, she has made it possible to grow this southern fruit in northern climes, for it appears the cold-resisting qualities of the more rugged pumpkin vine are transmitted to the cantaloupe. Also the period of growth is shortened 30 to 15 days, says the Christian

All this is said to have been accomplished without any deteriora tion in quality. In fact, it is stated that in most cases the flavor is im creased and that the vines with cantaloupe graftings also give a better-than-average yield both of cancontinue to grow on one and the same vine with them.

Serafima Lebedyeva began working with cantaloupes in 1925. Her present achievement is the result of many years of patient and painstaking experimenting with differ-ent varieties under various climatic and soil conditions. She has recenty been awarded a high Governnent decoration-the Order of the Red Banner of Labor-for her con-


