How to Place Crests On Swimming Suits

Instructions for placing crest on swimming trunk and suit. (Measurements to be taken while wearing trunk.) MEN: 1. On left side of trunk. One and one half inches down from top of trunk, making line to edge of badge. 2. Three and one half inches outward from mid-section of trunk to the nearest edge of badge. 3. Please interpret these instructions carefully and correctly in order that uniformity may be obtained. WOMEN: Place centre of Red Cross on the left-hand seam. Raise the left knee. Place crest just high enough to avoid having the crest crease when the knee is raised.
