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CHRISTMAS DINNER MENU

Tomato Juice with Parsley Garnish
Roast Turkey with Rice Stuffing
Mashed Potatoes

'Tis the season to be jolly and the air hums with festive plans for the coming yuletide, but the big event will be, as always, Christmas dinner.

You'll have traditional turkey, or chicken, or perhaps a roast of beef. You'll include all the family favorites, and here are some new ideas for trimmings for your Christmas dinner.

- 1 2-inch stick cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon whole cloves
- 4 cups fresh cranberries (2 lbs.)
- 2 envelopes plain unflavored gelatin
- 1 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup sugar, water and spices together for 5 minutes. Remove fruit and berries, and pour into 1 1/2 quart star-shaped mold; chill in refrigerator until firm. Unmold, garnish with holly sprigs, if desired.
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup bran
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup finely cut dried figs
- Blend shortening and honey. Add egg and beat well. Stir in milk and bran. Sift flour, soda and salt together and add to first mixture with figs. Mix thoroughly. Fill greased 1-quart mold 3/4 full, cover tightly and steam for 2 hours. Serve with hard sauce and other putting sauce. Makes 6 servings.
- Note: If figs are very dry, cover with boiling water and steam 10 minutes; drain thoroughly before cutting into pieces.
- Yield: 2 1/2 cups stuffing.
- Cranberry Christmas Mold
- 1 cup corn syrup
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups water
