

## FINED FOR ABUSING HORSE

### MEAFORD MAN WINS CASE

As a result of a dispute between Frank Garvey and the town of Mea-ford over the gravel deposits on the river bank abutting the latter's property which culminated in a lawsuit heard in Owen Sound in the Fall of 1945. Frank Garvey was granted an interim injunction, issued by His an interim injunction, issued by His Honor Judge G. W. Moriey as Local Master of the Supreme Court, restraining the town from trespassing on, or removing sand or gravel from the bank of the river claimed as being the plaintiff's property. Judgment handed down at Osgoode Hall recently regarding the case has granted judgment, according to the Meaford Express, as follows: An injunction restraining the defendant from trespassing upon the lands of the plaintiff; a mandatory order requiring the defendant to relands of the plaintiff; a mandatory order requiring the defendant to restore to the plaintiff's lands all support removed by the defendant and restore the river bank to the condition as it existed before Sept. 26, 1945 and the sum of \$1,000 damages for trespass and damage to the plaintiff's lands. The costs throughout will be to the plaintiff.

## Immigrant Farm Labor Available In 1948

Having in mind the immigration to Having in mind the immigration to Canada which is now taking place, and the possible increase in immigration during the near future, the Dominion-Provincial Farm Labor Committee of Ontario is anxious to obtain first hand and accurate information as to the number of farm workers that can be utilized by the farmers of Ontario for year-round employment.

Interviewed recently, Mr. R. S. Duncan, Assistant Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Chairman of the Dominion-Provincial Committee; stated that during the past twelve months nearly 2,000 Polish Veterans, Dutch families, and a smaller number of farmiles, and a shared the British imimgrants had entered the farm labor field, but that the committee is well aware of the necessity for tee is well aware of the necessity for greater numbers of workers if the needs of production are to be met and many more are available. It is known that in Europe there are many suitable workers, of long agricultural experience, both single men and married men with families, who are desperately anxious to come to Canada to rehabilitate themselves and their families. anxious to come to catata to remain-itate themselves and their families. These people are of different nationali-ties. In all cases, applicants are being carefully selected from the standpoint of health and suitability for the job. The Committee feels that thes rorkers will prove to pe a great asse o Ontario agriculture and will hel to fill the continuous demand for farm labor as expressed by farmers and farm organizations throughout the province but if they are to reach Can-ada in time for this summer's work, no time must be lost in obtaining lications from farmers for such work-

It will not be the policy to bring in workers unless a job is available for them before they leave Europe. Farm-ers who wish to obtain immigrant

farm help must apply for it.

Special application forms are now available at every National Employment Office in Ontario and also in the offices of the Agricultural Repre-sentatives. These should be filled in and returned to either the National Employment Office or the Agricul-tural Representative of his county. Mr. Duncan emphasizes the need for immediate action to avoid disappointment and states that approved applications will be filled in order of receipt. Applications should be filed not later than the end of February, 1948.
