

First the bed should be dug or cultivated thoroughly at least twice before the annuals are sown or set out. This gets rid of the weeds and gets the soil in good shape. For a long bed, three feet wide is about a minimum requirement. Into this one can plant dozens of different type annuals, with the smaller things generally at the front, the bigger things at the bottom. For tiny things like French Marigolds, allow about ten inches between, and for the biggest things like cosmos, full size zinnias, etc., two and a half to three feet is not too much room. Where one has only a small piece of ground available closer planting is advised in order






