While it is an extra chore for farmers to keep down weeds along the highway, a few hours of work done regularly, outside your fences, will mean fewer weeds inside them, later on.

Weed pulling may be tire-some, but the way daisy, bladder campion, Canada Thistle, cinquefoil, king devil, orange hawkweed, etcetra, reduce crops is a serious matter. Early cutting of hay works wonders in weed control, too.




