To the Electors of South Grey

During an election campaign, many promises are made and many irrelevant issues are introduced to divert the attention of the electors from the main issue, which should ever be, the record of the Government in office; its Honesty of purpose, its appreciation of the welfare and needs of the people and its business-like efficiency in discharging its great responsibilities. Briefly we are interested in Good Government.

I am sure we are in agreement when I say that the Drew Government's record has been such as to inspire respect and confidence and its efficient record over the past five years has never been surpassed in the history of Ontario.

During the nine years immediately preceding the Drew Administration, the Government to which Mr. Oliver gave his support added nearly 140 millions of dollars to the Provincial debt.
