# **Local Tax Rate** Raised 5 Mills

The keynote of the special meeting called on Tuesday evening of this week to accept the assessment roll and to strike a tax rate for the year 1948, was a raise of 5 mills from the 46-mill rate last year. With the one-mill subsidy from the province, this leaves a 50 mill rate for the taxpayers to look after in 1948.

The inflationary trend may be explained by the fact that more expenditures will be needed this year for school purposes, fire protection, streets school purposes, lite protection, sacreta, and general expenses. It is but in keeping with the higher cost for public services and facilities everywhere. Also a one mill rate is being added for sanitation purposes, and the revenue will be used to establish and maintain the state of the rise on will be used to establish and manufacture public toilets. To offset this rise on the expense sheet, the county rate has been reduced, while other expenses will remain about the same as last year. Markdale's population numbers 836 compared with 722 in 1945.
