Province Grants \$25000. Toward Public Hospital

Announced by Minister of Health
The Drew Government is prepared to put up enough money to go with what they already have to keep the hospital in Markdale and help the nine municipalities...

Russell T. Kelley, who is interested in small hospitals, was introduced by the chairman, Mr. F. D. Sawyer, at a meeting here on Saturday evening. He believes a great need in any town is to have a community spirit and he is all for having industries decentralized from the cities to the smaller places...

He referred to the enlarged provincial government grants available for hospitals through the amendment tax, explaining that instead of 60 cents per bed, each hospital of the province now receives a grant of \$140 a bed...

Bert, as he was familiarly called, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Brady, pioneer residents of the 11th line, Euphrasia township. For a number of years Mr. Brady was employed as section foreman at Markdale, and later at Owen Sound and Shelburne.

After nineteen years ago he purchased the former Wm. McLoughry farm on the east back-line where he and his wife, the former Amelia Caroline Sewell, farmed successfully.
