

Now that they're using egg shells commercially—and in a big way—about the only part of a chicken that goes to waste is the cackle, and sometimes we fancy we even hear sometimes we fanc wye even hear some of those coming over those "disc jockey" shows on the radio. Robert Frock of Nebraska is the one to find a use for the egg-shells. He is running what is claimed to

be the only egg-shell dehydrating plant in the U.S.—drying up and grinding into flour no less than half a million shells a day. Most of them go into livestock feed, re-placing bonemeal or limestone as a source of calcium. Some, however, are being used for human nutrition principally in hospitals. Frock claims that egg-she flour is cheaper than bonemeal and more diges ible than limestone and predicts that the day is coming when there won't be a wasted egg shell in the country.

The battle between the various types of fertilizer continues. A Dakota Experimental Station warns farmers not to expect that plowing under crops for "green manure" will step up the yields as much as using wet barnyard manure. This station has been doing both for some 30 years, and says that yields with barnyard manure were considerably greater than from the green manure crops such as sweet clover






