Camp for Junior Farmers Held At Geneva Park

Announcement is made by the Hon. Thomas L. Kennedy, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, that the Junior Farmers Leadership Training Camp for Ontario, the second to be held, will this year be held at Geneva Park, on the east shore of Lake Couchiching, 91 miles north of Toronto. Last year the first Junior Farmer Camp was held at Lake Ashqunyoong, on Lake Simcoe. The new site for 1948 will provide greater accommodation and facilities for the holding of a leadership camp. The camp period has also been extended this year, and will last for a full week, from September 6 to September 13. ber 6 to September 13.

One boy and one girl from each county in Ontario will be selected to attend the camp, the Minister announces. These will be boys and girls between the ages of 18 and 24 who have shown good leadership potentialities.
