



It seems as if the old motto migh wery well be charged to read "Eternal vigilance is the price of— bealthy tomatoes." For there is no doubt about it, in many sections of the country tomato diseases are becoming more serious every year.

So be sure and dust your tomatoes every ten days from the time the
first cluster of fruits is half developed. Use fermate, or a mixed dust containing fermate — alternating with a fixed copper dust. Both these are available under different trade names. The fermate controls the anthacnose disease which causes the rotting of tomatoes after and some-

rotting of tomatoes after and sometimes even before picking. The copper dust controls leaf diseases.

Too drastic pruning of hedges
during very bot weather may result in sunscalding of the leaves
and twigs too suddenly exposed.
This is especially dangerous for
evergreen hedges or trees. However, summer pruning will save you
a lot of trouble with overgrown
vines and shrubs, such as silvervines and shrubs, such as silver lace vine, spiraea, forsythia, grapes, Japanese yew and so forth. Branch-


