**YOUR HYDRO CHAIRMAN REPORTS
on the Power Shortage**

THE HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER COMMISSION OF ONTARIO

Dear Fellow Citizens:

The demand for electricity from all classes of the community—homes, farms and industries—all over Ontario, is still mounting. Homes are being built, the demand for increased production from farms is steadily increasing and industry is pressing forward with plans for expansion, plans that mean greater production and more jobs to keep Ontario prosperous.

It is anticipated that the increase in demand over the available supply will amount to in excess of four million kilowatt hours per day, and conservation measures have been put into effect as of Tuesday, September 14th. These will include reductions in lighting, office lighting and in other ways. Even with all these reductions we will still be short 1,200,000 kilowatt hours per day but to insist on more would have a hampering effect on industry and seriously reduce employment.

Where then can we get the vitally needed power? From you and every individual Hydro user in Ontario. How much should you save? Take a 60-watt electric lamp as an example. For every 24 hours it burns it requires almost one and a half kilowatt hours of current. If every one of the 900,000 Hydro users in Ontario will save the equivalent of that much electricity every day there will be no need for cut-offs.

Everyone must do his or her part. It should be a 24 hour effort. Turn off every light, switch off every motor or appliance that is not needed. Particularly, watch the switches on your electric range.

The situation is critical. Full employment must be maintained and the support of every household, every commercial user and every industrial consumer is essential in avoiding the waste of electricity.

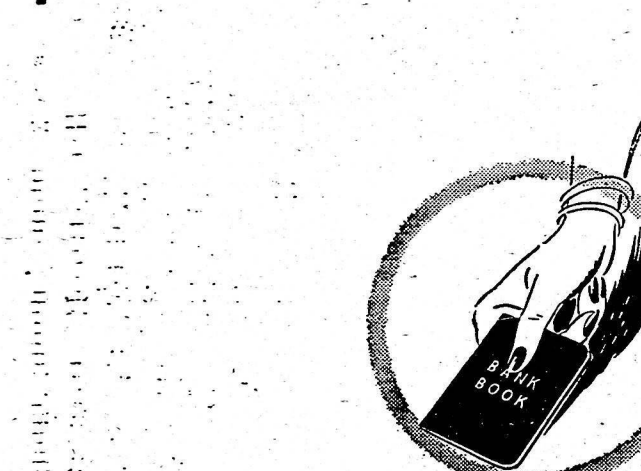
