

Every Forest Fire Is To Be Probed ---

From now on every forest fire in Ontario is to be thoroughly investigated, according to the Ministry of Lands and Forests, and in cases where carelessness is proved, those responsible will be assessed for the cost of fighting the fire and for loss of timber.

for the cost of fighting the hre and for loss of timber.

It is reported that while loss in the largest fires was heavy, salvage possibilities are good and operations have already started to save some of the scorched timber. In 1948 the Department has already fought, and extinguished, more than 800 fires. Two of-the fires, in the Chapleau and Sault Ste. Marie forest districts, raged for more than three works despite the efforts of three weeks, despite the efforts of thousands of men and a million dol-

\$35 million, a figure not entirely agreed with by the Department. In some places, fires jumped from one place to another, leaving large patches of untouched timber in between. These areas are now being surveyed and cutting operations will start as soon as possible. While a lot of trees were killed, they were not completely spoiled for timber-






