FARM BULLETIN

MORE LEGUME FORAGE NEEDED

Today the legume acreage in Canada is very considerably less than 20 years ago; yet legumes are vitally important to farmers for soil improvement, as hay, pasture and silage crops, and as sources of valuable concentrate.

It is always good farm economy to produce as much home-grown protein-rich foods as possible, experts point out. And this is especially important now when both animal and vegetable protein supplements are scarce. High quality legume hay and pasture is a sure way to keep down the live stock feed bill.

The correct seed mixture and seeding method and proper plant food are important in growing high quality legumes. In annual mixtures a seed mistake affects one year's crop. In perennial crops, the mistake repeats itself yearly.
