Rotary Club Told About Health Units

The workings of the Lincoln County Health Unit, which is typical of the twenty-four such units now operating throughout Ontario, was explained at a meeting of the Markdale Rotary Club on Monday evening.

Explaining how the Health Unit was organized, Mr. Carefoot (brother of Dr. R. L. Carefoot of Markdale) said the County Council must make request to the Department, and a request must also come from a City if it wishes to be included in the same.

The workings of this Health Unit were then explained by Dr. Curry, who has been health officer for many years. "A unit," he said, "costs \$1.25 per capita to get started, and costs the County Council 62¢ per year of the Provincial grant. Its basic services are outlined by the chief director of the Lincoln Health Unit as varied and of the most importance.

At the clinics, (there are ten in Lincoln County) he explained there is a physician, two nurses, and two lay workers. Here Dr. Curry paid tribute to the good work done by Women's Institutes who provide two lay workers, often provide a place for such clinics and often look after Child Health Clinics.

School health is also the concern of the County Health Unit. In elementary grades, the Medical Health Officers and nurse attend regularly to try to discover early defects. Medical examinations are given in grades 1 and 8; when pupils are absent, the nurse makes a visit to that home to ascertain the cause.

Concluding his story of health units, Dr. Curry explained that any county can have these services because of the government grant. These units are functioning successfully in neighboring Bruce County. When it covers all of Ontario as it eventually will, living conditions will be improved, and we'll have a happier province than we have today.
