Must Save Hydro

We are in the middle of a serious
power shortage and it has come to the
point where each householder in Markdale must do something about it.

Consumption of hydro in the village is far exceeding the quota of 2500 kilowatt hours, and unless a drastic rut is made immediately, residents may rut is made immediately, residents may expect hydro shut-offs. It is said that Ontario homemakers exercise control over about 35% of the electricity used, and by each and every one making a small saving the overall consumption may be brought low enough to continue full time service. But if domestic consumers refuse to co-operate, then the beat commission parison under the conference of the consumers of the consumers of the conference of the local commission acting under orders from Toronto, has no alternative but to pull the switches, and we will find ourselves in a blackout.

In an effort to meet the 10% reduc-In an effort to meet the low reduc-tion required a meeting of the town's businessmen and women met on Mon-day night in the Library to decide how this can be done. It was agreed by all present to close their stores at 5 o'clock and they are hoping for the co-opera-tion of every one concerned, in order to come within the quota.

A number of suggestions were volunteered as to how householders might untered as to now noteriouses might save, such as making a house-to-house canvass to request each householder to do her part. It was also suggested to use smaller bulbs, to turn lights and motors off when not in use, to use natural light as much as possible, in short to do everything in ones power to save electricity.

The biggest users of electricity in a town like Markdale are the electric heaters, stoves, and other appliances and water heaters. It is individual householders that must save. If the quota is not adhered to, there will be a pulling of switches fifteen minutes every hour between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. which would be a real hardship in many places. It would be better for everyone to cut down NOW.
