FARM BULLETIN

MORE AND BETTER POTATOES

Many very successful potato growers always green sprout them before planting. Seed potatoes for this purpose are taken from storage at least ten to fourteen days before planting. Tubers are selected for size, type and freedom from disease, and are then treated with a recommended seed disinfectant to destroy disease organisms on the surface. After this, tubers are spread on the floor, not more than two or three deep, exposed to light. This helps dry them and also starts sprouting, which aids somewhat in cutting and hastens come-up after planting. Only tubers producing strong, vigorous sprouts are used and these are not removed. This aids in the development of full maturity for satisfactory cooking quality.

Your nearest experimental farm or agricultural college is familiar with highly successful methods of potato growing. Their cooperation is yours for the asking.
