**PURITY PASTRY** (enough for 2 pie shells)  
Sift together 1 1/2 cups PURITY flour and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut in 1/2 cup butter and 1/2 cup shortening. Add 1/2 cup cold water. Add 1/2 cup raisins. Mix with two knives, until it holds like very coarse meal. Add 1/2 cup cold water to hold mixture together. Chill dough for 2 or 3 hours. Roll out on a lightly floured board. Roll with light quick motion to 1/4 inch thickness. Prick dough lightly with a fork so that no air bubbles are trapped, and run off the edge.

**FILLING** (1 pie)  
Beat 1 egg only until whites and yolks are well blended. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup white sugar and add 1/2 cup brown sugar. Add 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup raisins. Beat until mixture is smooth. Add 1/2 cup flour and 1/2 cup raisins. Cook in 200° F. oven for 15 minutes. Cool and serve with whipped cream. (Filling recipe may be doubled if you wish a pumpkin pie.)

### FARM BULLETIN

## MORE AND BETTER POTATOES

Many very successful potato growers always green sprout them before planting. Seed potatoes for this purpose are taken from storage at least ten to fourteen days before planting. Tubers are selected for size, type and freedom from disease, and are then treated with a recommended seed disinfectant to destroy disease organisms on the surface. After this, tubers are spread on the floor, not more than two or three deep, exposed to light. This hardens the skin and also starts sprouting, which aids somewhat in cutting and hastens come-up after planting. Only tubers producing strong, vigorous sprouts are used and these are not removed. This aids in the development of full maturity for satisfactory cooking quality.

Your nearest experimental farm or agricultural college is familiar with highly successful methods of potato growing. Their cooperation is yours for the asking.
