Job, more than any other book in the Bible may be called a drama. The most dramatic part tells of the series of disasters which suddenly sweep away everything that Job had (1:13-19). There is nothing else in Scripture which can compare with this in dramatic effect except perhaps the tense scene except perhaps the tense scene where Esther plead for her life and the lives of her people. The prologue and epilogue of the book of Job are in prose; The bulk of the book - Chapters 4-31 - is


