ROTARY SPEAKER DESCRIBES CANADA'S 'NEWEST PROVINCE'

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New Hospital Offer

Made by Prov. Bd.

The public hospital project which has been a live issue here for several months, and far from being settled, a new offer was made by the Provincial Board when they met in the Dept. of Agriculture office here last Friday afternoon, moved by Milton Henry and seconded by Harold Daxen.

The offer, which came as a complete surprise to Dr. Carefoot and the public as well, contained ten clauses, chief of which was that they agree to pay \$70,000 for the hospital at such time as it is equipped with an elevator and other alterations as required in the government regulations.

With grants available to cover the full purchase price when the necessary alterations are completed, the only disagreement seems to be who should be responsible for the alterations. In the meantime 1948 is drawing to a close. The fiscal year for both provincial and federal grants closes on March 31st, which leaves little time to make the alterations required and qualify for the grants promised.

The offer of \$70,000 which appeared in Saturday's Sun-Times was misleading to the public in that it stated that they had estimated the elevator and any change connected therewith to cost from \$10,000 to \$20,000, whereas the Board officials have testified they had no written tenders submitted.

One good contractor who had estimated the cost, but had not tendered, said it would cost at least \$3000 over the \$20,000. Dr. Carefoot appreciated the confidence placed in him that he could carry out the alterations, he does not feel that his work would allow him to take on any more burdens.

Those who are hospital conscious are hoping things get moving and that the cost of the year may see something definite accomplished. To have a hospital within our grasp and money enough for its purchase handed to us as it were, on a silver platter, is a bright picture, compared with those places that have strained every source for needed funds, and are left with a substantial mortgage to be paid off.

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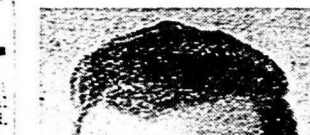
