### SAFETY FIRST IS GOOD FARM RULE

During the winter months when things are not quite so busy on the farm is a good time to remedy that hazard which nearly caused an accident back in the summer. Perhaps it was a faulty trap-door or inadequately protected stairs in the barn, an unsafe bull-pen, or loose boards on the house veranda. Whatever it was, if it isn't fixed there may be a real accident this summer.

It is estimated that there were 37,200 non-fatal accidents on Canadian farms in '47, and 30,000 of these were to men. During the same year in the United States 19,500 farm people were killed accidentally and 1,800,000 were involved in non-fatal injuries involving lost time.

Many of these accidents should not have occurred. For instance, on Canadian farms the most frequent accident is from falls, and the most frequent cause is the existence of trap-doors and inadequately protected stairs. Hand railings on open stairs, and a railing to guard every stairway opening and trap-door, will prevent many injurious falls. New treads to replace old worn out steps on stairways may cost a little more than patching, but will probably cost less than a doctor's bill and time lost while a broken bone is mending. Patched steps give a sense of security that only too often does not exist. Plenty of light is an added precaution, and stairs in a barn are much safer when kept free from hay and chaff.

A cause of some farm accidents which is often overlooked is the use of too loose clothing. Long, loose slickers worn on a wet day can cause a stumble, or if it is windy can blow into engines or machinery which is in operation.

In this latter hazard it reduces the risk somewhat if a belt is worn with such garments.

### GREY COUNTY FORUM NEWS

According to reports to hand, Grey County had another very interesting time discussing the topic "IN TIME OF NEED" and are almost unanimous in their findings. All thoughts social security measures such as Family Allowances, unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation, health insurance and old age pension were a good thing. A few qualified their remarks, as Desboro north puts it: "There is a tendency to make the government responsible for too much, thus taking away initiative."

"Orange Valley"—We think social measures are a good thing and as times advance will be very much needed. East Linton—"Social measures are a good thing except for the fact you have a flat wallet after paying for Fire, Life, Car, Wind, Hall and Health Insurance and farm taxes and if there is fire cents over, Income Tax." Cheeseville—"A good thing when not abused." Hampden answers for many with "Old age pensions should be given to all men and women on reaching 65 and should be on a sliding scale in accordance with the cost of living."

Many commented on Family Allowances and Health Insurance very favorably. Many forums use Grey County Medical Services as an example of what people can do for themselves at a very low cost rate per family and so we find almost all forum people in favour of providing services which create a sense of security from want as people grow older. If people hoard money it is then taken out of circulation.

To question (1) all forums answered "YES". Lamlash says "The trend to such measures is good, the family allowance helps the small wage earner, especially those with large families. Health Insurance means a plan for pooling the costs of medical care so that adequate treatment is available to every one regardless of income. Welts Corners—"Social security measures are good but they may tend to make some people more or less shiftless. "Sand Hill—"A good thing. It helps to keep money moving and may help to save us from a depression." Camperdown—"Social security measures are good but are sometimes abused, but we think a security from the cradle to the grave could and should be worked out."

The answer to question (2) brings what may be a surprise to many people who think that farmers cannot stop working or should we say never dream of quitting producing food at a price below cost of production, for we find that among these farmers whose average age is around 57 the vast majority are asking that old age pensions be paid to all people at the age of 65.

A few more quotations: Hi-lan—"We think pensions should be given at 65. Amount to vary according to cost of living, financed by taxation through a special fund. Hoath Head—"Every one should receive a pension at 65 the same as the family allowance." Edge Hill—"All men at 65 and women at 60 should get \$50. per month. Straight Line, Proton, suggests lowering the old age pension age to 65 years, abolishing the means test and not paying it out of the regular national revenue, but by special taxation to everyone between the age of 21 and 65. Therefore all superannuation fees should be discontinued. South Glenelg—"65 years should be the age at which the old age pension should be payable, financed by direct taxation, everyone should be eligible." South Bentinck—"Everyone should get a pension of \$50. per month at the age of 65 regardless of their social or financial standing through taxation."

Next week is review night, many forums are planning a social evening. Others, like Louise, are planning to discuss their Agricultural Society. Others are planning on discussing Co-op-car insurance. We note Campbell's Corner have organized a choral group. What will your forum have as an accomplished project? The weatherman did not prevent Straight Line, Proton forum from meeting. The condition of the roads was too icy for horses so one member took his tractor and sleigh to transport his neighbors two miles to his waiting car on a county road. Thence seven miles to Farm Forum and a very interesting meeting. Vandeleur is planning on extending their road windbreak project, having ordered 1750 trees.
