

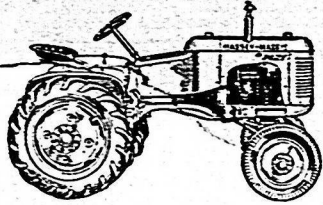

The regular meeting of Euphrasia Council was held on Feb. 5th, 1949, with all members present and the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Mr. Sewell - Thompson—That the Clerk be instructed to write the Municipal Board re advancement of money for current expenditure of Beaver Valley Municipal Telephone System; if satisfactory word is received, the Clerk to be authorized to notify the Bank of Toronto, Clarksburg, that said money will be advanced to the System as required up to the amount of their requisition.—Carried.

Thompson - Cowling—That this Council renew Treasurer's bond at a premium of \$20.00 payable to Samuel Saunders.—Carried.

Lougheed - Cowling—That this Council request the Department of Municipal Affairs for approval of grant for repairing Memorial Hall, Kimbley, to the amount of \$50.00; also the required amount for repairs to Memorial Gates at Rocklyn.—Cd.

Sewell - Lougheed—That the Treasurer receive the following: Hall rent, \$7.00; County of Grey, fox bounty, \$6.00; province of Ontario, relief, \$28.04; E. Sewell, grader rental, \$5.00; 1948 road subsidy, \$762.27; Snow Clubs, Deviation, \$25.00; 7th Line north, \$80.00; East Mountain, \$116.00; Sideroad, \$50.00; 4th Line, \$150.00; Wodehouse, \$75.00; Ted Myles, \$10.00; Epping, \$55.00; Harkaway, \$66.00; Quiet Valley, \$21.00; Wodehouse, \$108.00; General Snow Club (English Church Sideroad) \$27.00.—Carried.

Thompson - Lougheed—That By-Law No. 3 be now read a second and third time and finally passed.—Cd.

Lougheed - Cowling—That By-law No. 4, to provide estimated expenditure of \$40,000 on Township roads during 1949, be read a first time.—Cd.

Sewell - Cowling—That By-Law No. 4 be now read a second and third time and forwarded to the Department for approval.—Carried.

Sewell - Lougheed—That Jack Jenkins be appointed as Weed Inspector for 1949 at the pleasure of the Council.—Carried.

Sewell - Thompson—That this Council appoint C. E. McClean as delegate to the Good Roads Convention with expenses paid.—Carried.

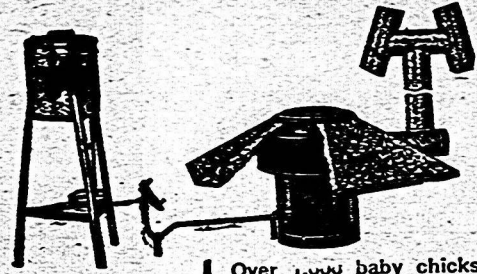
