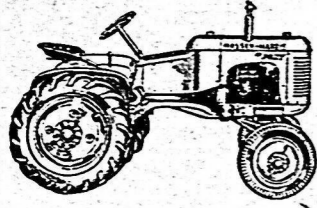

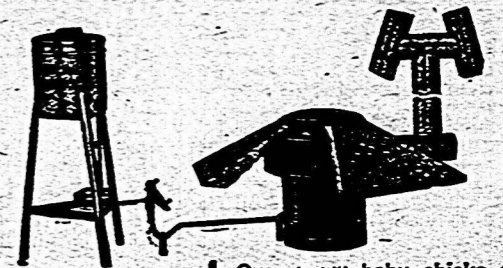
This concluding the business it was moved by E. Craven and seconded by S. Hamill that the meeting adjourn.
