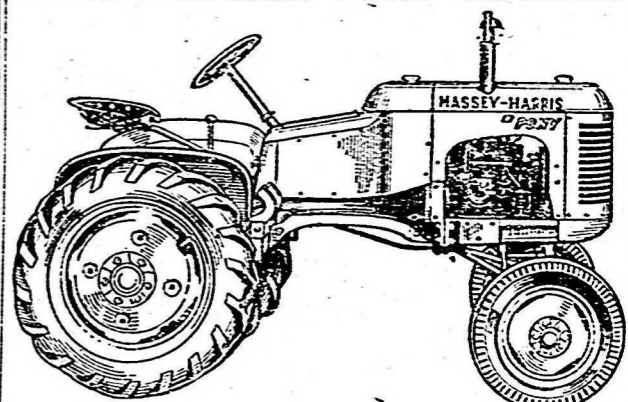

We regret very much the necessity of adopting this policy. However, the amount of second grade cream we receive is small, and the best solution to the problem is to care for the cream in such a way that there will be no second grade.

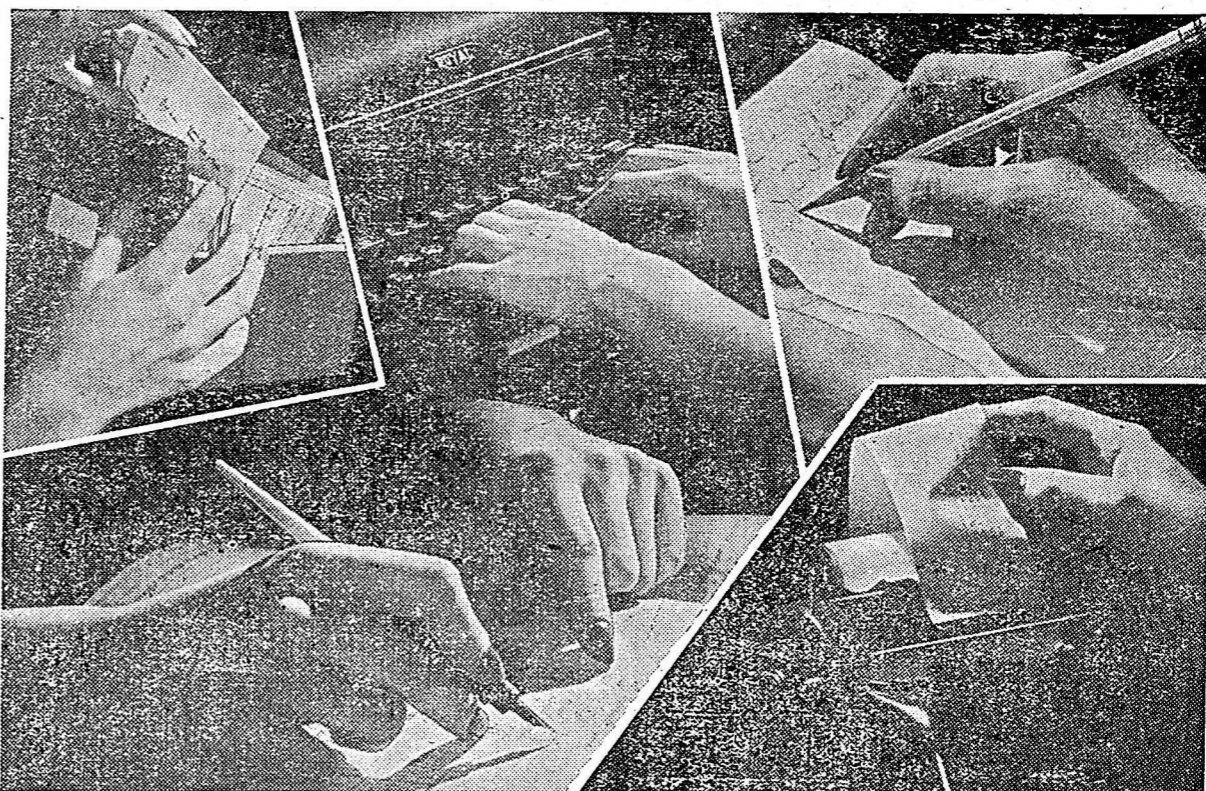
