Plant Windbreak
About 9:30 Friday morning, April 22nd, planting started on the second Community Reforestation Plot and windbreak to be planted in this neighborhood. Mr. J. C. Jackson of Owen Sound, Forest Officer for Grey and Bruce, and Mr. Bailey of the Forestry Department in Toronto, were present to see the project started, and both addressed the planters, who consisted of about a dozen men and several children.
Mr. Jackson told many things about reforestation, gave instructions re planting, and answered many questions. He then dug a hole and Ruth Graham, the only girl present, had the honor of putting in the first tree.
Mr. Bailey stated that the Department now had mechanical planters which would plant over forty thousand trees a day.
The plot is about 40 rods long and 4 rods wide and is situated along the Meaford Road, south of the one planted last year. Both plots were purchased from Mrs. Ethel Hutchinson.
A splendid program of sound moving pictures was shown in the Community Hall on Monday evening, April 25th by Dave Anderson, Field Officer for Grey County. The pictures, about a dozen pictures were shown on various interesting subjects, the most outstanding being as follows: "Holidaying in Banff National Park", "Canada's Ukrainian Population", "When All the People Play" (a rural recreational project developed in Annapolis Royal), and "Making Photographs of Canada from the Air".
It was decided to have the next showing on Friday evening, May 27th, when school pictures will also be shown.
Mr. Anderson was introduced by Howard Graham and thanked by Will Ratcliffe and Will Johnston.

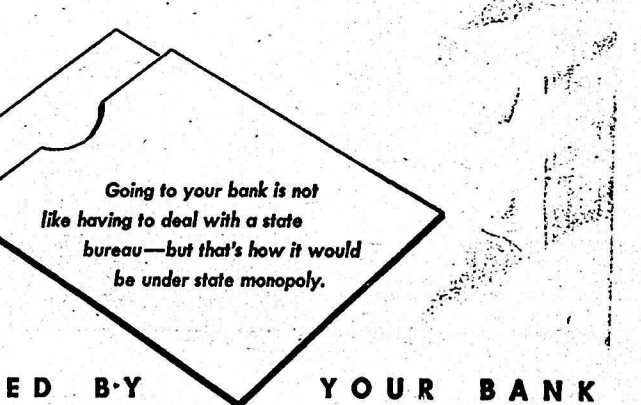
Mrs. Edwards then took the chair again and thanked the members for their re-election and welcomed the new members. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
