North Grey Elects Colin Bennett, Liberal

Colin Bennett, lawyer and town clerk of Meaford, the Liberal candidate in North Grey, was elected on Monday. Making his first bid for public office, he rolled up an overall majority of 865 votes over his two opponents, W. Garfield Case, Progressive Conservative, and Elgin MacNab, C.C.F.

Mr. Bennett received 9,892 votes; Mr. Case, 7,583; and Mr. MacNab, 1,344. The vote in Euphrasia was as follows: Bennett, 425; Case, 424; MacNab, 33. In Holland, the electors gave Bennett 439 votes, Case 539, and MacNab 39. 357 Township results were: Bennett 355, Case 403, MacNab 60.

Mr. Case defeated Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton in the North Grey by-election of 1945 and was returned to office in the general election of the same year.

MRS. BROWN'S SISTER DIES IN VANCOUVER

It was agreed to try to have some special missionary programs and slides this year, and to have a representative from each of the eight schools on the executive. Mr. Salton offered to show what slides he had, so a rally was planned to be held in the New England Church in the near future.

In the absence of Mr. Braden, Mrs. Salton ably conducted the evening song service and devotional. A demonstration lesson with the use of flannelgraph was conducted by Mrs. R. Rennie, and she also showed the books of the Bible as a library. Mrs. Salton sang "Saviour, Thy Dying Love."

When the register was added, the motto went to Temple Hill Sunday School. They had a total of 29 attending the convention. The offerings for the day amounted to \$18.22, making a balance on hand of \$32.48.

Mrs. Neelands' address for the evening session was "Are you more than a signpost?" She told a number of stories of signposts being blurred or pointing in the wrong direction. The meeting was closed by singing a hymn and with a prayer by Mr. Armstrong.

Council Limits Water Use For Lawns

Dr. R. L. Carefoot, the reeve, presided over the June meeting of the council of Markdale, which was held on Monday in the Library basement. A. J. Norris addressed the council about its insurance coverage and introduced G. A. Beatty, who has purchased an insurance business from him. Mr. Norris said the Centennial Committee is arranging for liability protection for the corporation and the committee during the four days of the Centennial.

Insurance premiums totalling \$466.95 were authorized to be paid to Mr. Beatty for 1949-1950, on motion by Councillors W. W. Alcox and J. A. Hamilton.

Councillor L. E. Turner, chairman of the waterworks department, said too much water is being used for lawn service at night. He said the tank, which holds about 60,000 gallons, is filled at night and in the morning it is drained. If a fire broke out in the night, there would be no pressure to put it out, he told the council.

On motion by Councillors Turner and H. S. Merriam, the use of lawn taps was restricted after 8 p.m. until 7 o'clock the following morning. Clerk T. Tuck, who read the minutes, informed the council that the local hospital changed to the status of a public hospital at the first of the year and it is now exempt from taxes, except for local improvements.

Councillor Alcox, chairman of the Markdale Hydro Commission, said the installation of lights on the new standards would be started on Wednesday.

On resolution by Councillors Alcox and Merriam, it was resolved that the Markdale Hydro Commission be permitted to borrow \$1,500 from the Waterworks Department for three months, at three per cent. interest, to complete hydro work on the streets.

Al. Promaine spoke on behalf of the Baseball Association, asking the council to have the diamond graded. He said the members worked on the diamond on Saturday, and he thought a few hours with a grader would put it in good condition for playing. He said the association has arranged to have the diamond cared for. The council agreed to have a grader work on the diamond for four hours on Thursday morning.

Dr. Carefoot, who attended the session of the Grey County council in Owen Sound last week, said the county rate is the same, 10 1/2 mills. Permission was given to the board of management of the Grey County Home, he reported, to obtain tenders for the improvements and the building of a new wing to it. It had been hoped to be able to erect two wings. A new wing will accommodate 34 residents. A new heating plant to be installed will take care of any additions to the home. Dr. Carefoot explained that a master plan has been drawn to eventually take care of 250 residents.

He said the county council gave permission for the spending of about \$180,000, although the board's plans for the additions and improvements called for an expenditure of about \$250,000. When the board has received tenders for the work, the county council will meet again to consider them.

Dr. Carefoot told the council some of the departmental rulings for county homes, one of which is that women must be segregated into four classes, according to health. He said the department will pay 50 per cent. of the cost, Owen Sound one-quarter, and the county the remainder. The new wing is expected to cost \$60,000.

The work on the home was one of the chief discussions at the council meeting in Owen Sound, he reported. A discussion about the new enlarged secondary school plan was left over to the fall session.

Accounts passed by the council included: Water, \$398.53; Hydro-Electric Power, Commission power, \$796.52; material, labor, etc., \$2,165.25; general accounts, \$994.02; street lighting, \$479.50; insurance, \$466.95.

T. S. COOPER ON COMMITTEE

A committee was appointed by the Grey County council last week to invite the select committee of the House of Commons to meet in Owen Sound on July 21st. The committee members are Warden George South of Heathcote, Reeve Stuart Howey of Holland, and T. Stewart Cooper of Markdale, the agricultural representative.

Grey-Bruce Electors Return Walter E. Harris

Walter E. Harris, of the local legal firm of Harris & Dunlop, was re-elected to the House of Commons in Monday's election. The Liberal candidate for Grey-Bruce, he has represented the riding since 1949, when he defeated Miss Agnes Macphail, the U.F.O.-Labor member for 19 years.

In Markdale, Mr. Harris received 280 votes. Frank D. Sawyer, principal of the Markdale High School, the Progressive Conservative candidate, was given 242 votes, and Rudolph Baltruweit, Clifford farmer, who represented the C.C.F. party, received 24 votes.

Mr. Harris was parliamentary assistant to Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent in the last Parliament.

In the 1945 election, Mr. Harris, then just returned from action in Europe, where he was wounded, defeated John Grierson, Progressive Conservative, and Alfred Sachs of Elmwood, C.C.F. Results at that time were: Harris 8,661, Grierson 7,356, Sachs 910.

When Mr. Harris wrested the riding from Miss Macphail in 1949 she had been the Grey-Bruce member for five consecutive terms. She was the pioneer woman member of the House. She is now the York East member of the Ontario Legislature.

For his work in bringing Newfoundland into union with Canada this year, Mr. Harris was commended by Prime Minister St. Laurent, who called him "one of the fathers of greater confederation."

This time, Mr. Harris had a majority in every one of the riding's 21 municipalities but Dundalk, where Mr. Sawyer had a majority of 32 votes over Mr. Harris' 214. His biggest majority was received in Carriek Township, as was the case also in the 1945 election. He had 1,220 votes this time to Mr. Sawyer's 238 in Carriek.

Mr. Baltruweit trailed both of the other two candidates in every municipality but Neustadt, where he received 42 votes to Mr. Sawyer's 26. He received his highest vote in Hanover, where he got 263; and his lowest in Flesherston, where he received only two votes.

Mr. Sawyer's highest number of votes came in Walkerton, where he had 544. His lowest was 26, in Neustadt.

Prime Minister of Canada

County Council Endorses Home's Expansion Plan

At the session of the Grey County council, in Owen Sound on Thursday afternoon, the plans of the board of management of the Grey County Home for its expansion were endorsed, with one exception. The members of the council endorsed one new wing instead of two.

The second wing can be added later, and the new wing, when erected, will provide accommodation for residents who are now quartered on the third floor. The fire marshal has ordered that the residents must be moved out of the third floor as soon as possible.

The board of management may proceed to seek tenders for the construction of the addition and for remodeling the existing building at the home, along with definite estimates as to the cost.

The council endorsed the following features of the plan presented by the board: One new wing with ramp leading to main building, new stairs at each end of the present building, new boiler and building to house it, necessary alterations to the present building, a residence for the superintendent, and renovation of the heating system. The estimated cost is \$197,000.

Dr. R. L. Carefoot, reeve of Markdale, speaking for the board of management, said the board would be as pleased as the other members of the council if the expansion of the home could be left over for some months, but this would be impossible in view of the fire marshal's report. Dr. Carefoot said it is expected that permission for the same number of residents as before to be assigned to each room may be obtained from the Department of Welfare. This, he said, would be temporary, however, as the department's regulations as to the minimum number of square feet of floor space per bed are not followed out in the existing building.

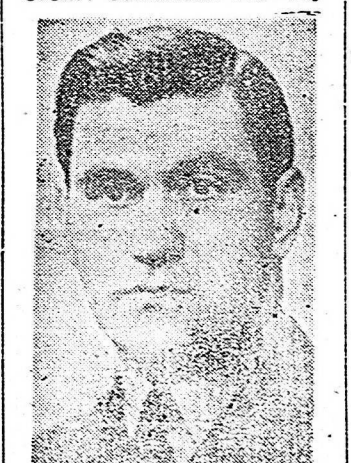
