Grey County Council Hosts To Wellington. Approximately 35 members of Wellington County council, officials and guests, including Warden Orville Wright of Waterloo County, toured Grey County on Wednesday last.

After a short tour of the equipment depot and adjoining gravel-crushing plant, conducted by ex-Reeve John McGirr of Glenelg Township, chairman of the Trees Conservation Commission, busses exchanged representatives of each county, so that visitors and hosts were mixed, and left for Hanover.

Announcing his decision in the damages action, Lorne Adams of Markdale against the Guelph Metal Company and its two truck drivers, James A. and Clifford Featherstone, Judge G. W. Morley, in Owen Sound, assessed damages at \$333.10 to the plaintiff and \$94.95 to the defendants, finding each 50 per cent. negligent in the traffic accident out of which the case arose.

The accident in which the principals were involved occurred three miles north of Chatsworth on November 13, 1947, as the plaintiff drove north behind a Guilph Metal Company truck driven by James A. Featherstone. Clifford Featherstone, the other defendant, was following Adams in a second truck owned by the same company.

When the first truck stopped, Adams crashed into its rear and the second truck struck his car.

Orange Lodges Attend Presbyterian Church

The members of L.O.L. No. 1045, the Lady Sproule L.O.B.A., and the Junior Orange Lodge paraded from the lodgerooms to Cooke's Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening, led by E. E. (Buster) Langman, wearing the kilt, who played the bagpipes, and Ross Alexco with the drum.

Mr. McReynolds spoke about the origin of the Orange Association, tracing it to the invitation to William of Orange to go to England from Holland. He also spoke about Martin Luther and his contribution to the Protestant cause.

Mr. McReynolds said pleasure is the goal of this world. "We have gotten away from God, and we need to get back," he said, closing his sermon with the question, "Are you giving Jesus Christ first place in your life?"

During the service, Miss Doreen Alexco sang a solo, "When Morning Dawns," and the choir, with Mrs. W. W. Alexco, the organist and choir-leader, presiding at the organ, sang an anthem, "True-Hearted, Wholehearted."

Dismisses Action Against Euphrasia

Mr. Justice Barlow has delivered judgment in the action brought by Harold T. Fawcett and Frederick W. Fawcett against the Township of Euphrasia, dismissing the action with costs. Evidence in this case was heard at the non-jury sittings of the Supreme Court in Owen Sound. The plaintiffs sought a declaration that by-law No. 11 of the defendant corporation is void and of no effect, and that by-law No. 242 of said corporation is valid and subsisting by-law, for mandatory order requiring defendant to keep road described in by-law open and in proper state of repair, to maintain it as a township road, and for damages. J. F. Woods, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, F. G. McKay, K.C., and Colin F. Bennett for defendant.

Free Tickets For "Neighbourly News"

"Neighbourly News", with Don Fairbairn, heard each Sunday morning over CBL will originate in Markdale on July 31st, and, what is more, local people may attend this radio broadcast free of charge. Tickets will be available for this program, which will be held in the Markdale Arena. Already the Bell Telephone Company has erected a line into the arena and seating accommodation and decorating will be looked after at an early date. Markdale people will welcome this, their first opportunity of seeing some of the radio announcers for the first time, and following the procedure which they ordinarily "tune in" to hear. It will also be interesting to see and hear local people presented and to see how this regular feature is conducted every Sunday morning at 10:03.

On July 31st, however, it will begin at 9:45, when 15 minutes will be taken up with the "Radio to Markdale." This will consist of some of the highlights of Markdale's history and of the Centennial. There will be a three-minute interval while the C.B.C. news is carried on the network, which will be followed by "Neighbourly News" with Don Fairbairn.

Best of all, it is free to all persons who wish to attend. Tickets may be obtained for the asking by calling at The Standard office, and you must have a ticket to be admitted. It is necessary that all persons are in their seats by 9:30 when the doors will be closed. This enables the program to carry on with no disturbance.

Rotary Club Provides Free Swimming Lessons

The children of Markdale are very fortunate in having a swimming pool at all, and even though the water is somewhat cold, it cannot be made too clear that all children should learn to swim, and it is the duty of parents to see to it that they do so.

The Markdale Rotary Club has made this doubly possible by bringing in a competent swimming instructor who is endeavoring to organize several classes a day, taking in the small children, older children, and adults.

So far the lack of interest in this opportunity is appalling. Every child in the village should register for lessons, and be there every time possible for the appointed classes.

The lessons are free, and all that is asked is that everyone co-operate with the instructor, Ross Clark, in every way. He is in full charge of swimming, and the proper conduct of those attending the pool.

Various complaints have been heard about the instructor not helping certain people. Let it be made clear that he is not expected to run around and coax people to take lessons. It is up to you yourself to register for classes, and to ask for help at other times when you wish it and he is not busy with other classes.
